## Sill Tre Time Travel - Location Puzzle

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For the 10th anniversary of Puzzled Pint we thought it would be great to take the time to go visit all the new cities that have joined since Puzzled Pint's humble beginnings. The only problem is that there are so many cities now, we couldn't figure out how to make it to all of them at once. The only answer was to manipulate time itself! So we put our best people on figuring out how best to travel through time to make it to all the events.
We screened a bunch of famous time machines, but some of them must not have been calibrated quite right cause we had a hard time showing up on time!


It's Puzzled Pint's second birthday at the Funhouse Lounge! Remember how we had to cut the night short because of the improv show at 8:30? Let's stick around and watch it this time.
There were eight improv skits, each with a different setting suggested by the audience. The performances were scored by a panel of judges. Use the clues below to figure out the skit setting, order, and scores. Once you have completed this task, split the scores to discover what I feel like when I'm trying a new act on stage.

1. The Red Carpet skit (which scored 30 points higher than the Hospital skit) happened prior to and scored lower than the Stadium skit.
2. The Truckstop skit scored two points higher than the Pirate Ship skit.
3. The second skit (which didn't feature a Nightclub) scored just 15 points.
4. The fifth skit scored ten points lower than the highest scoring skit (which was the seventh skit of the evening).
5. The lowest scoring skit scored just seven points. The lowest scoring skit occurred two slots before the Post Office skit.
6. The last skit of the evening took place in a Karaoke Bar, and scored four points lower than the Stadium skit.
7. The sixth skit of the night scored three points lower than the Hospital skit.
8. The Red Carpet skit occurred two slots after and scored 20 points lower than the Pirate ship skit.
9. The Truckstop skit scored 60 points higher than the fourth skit of the evening.
10. The highest scoring skit scored 67 points.

## Beyond Thunderdome

Starting at each arrow, fill in the two rings (inner and outer) and the zigzag using the provided clues. Words do not overlap and will vary in length. Once you've filled letters into the illustration, copy the letters at the numbered points down below.

1. The shapes are all countries that hosted Puzzled Pint on the 8th anniversary. (As of July 2020, all still host Puzzled Pint.)
2. The ten sets of nonsense letters can be anagrammed into ten of the countries (hinted by "mixed up" in the flavortext) - but different ones than each shape.
3. Chain together the countries. Use the anagrammed country to connect each outlned country to each other. (South Africa has no anagram on it, as it is the final country.)
4. Use the number next to each outlined country to index into the country's name. Order these letters by the chain in the prior step to get the answer.

It's about beer!! Fill the pint glasses with your answers.

It's about friends!! Cut out the square, then connect the three famous pairs of friends: use a straightedge to carefully draw a line between the dots of their exclamation points. Then, starting with the longest line and ending with the shortest, mountain-fold along each line you've drawn (i.e. the pints should end up on the outside). Finally, make two more folds, such that each lone individual gets joined up with a team. HAN and LUKE, BUZZ and WOODY, SNOOPY and WOODSTOCK
It's about done!! Separate the two layers slightly by sliding a finger between them, and squeeze the sides gently. Hold the object so that you're looking at the side with the double exclamation points.

Follow the exclamatory instructions that you have written there.
