



"...Antelope, Guggenheim, Albert, Salami, Giggly, Jumpy, Tom, Thomas, Tambourine, Leg-Face McCullen, Artichoke, Penguin, Pete, Steve... But I think the very worst name for this frog is..." - Greg

This puzzle is based on the puzzle game peg solitaire. Each move, one frog jumps over an adjacent frog to the empty space on the other side. The two frogs exchange a letter from one position to make two new words. So if HOPE jumps over REED, HOPE takes the first letter of **REED** to become **HEED**, and continues in the puzzle. **REED** takes the first letter of HOPE to become ROPE, but is then removed from the puzzle as in peg solitaire. We continue jumping until only one frog remains. This final frog will be on the special lilypad with a lotus flower.

The puzzle is structured like a tournament bracket, so the last frog left of one puzzle follows the large black arrow to move to the next puzzle. The final frogs who wind up on the final lilypads on the bottom puzzle are named MORSE and TOAD, giving us the worst frog name: MORSE TOAD.

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## WANDERING THE WOODS

Solve the Signpost path puzzles, then trace the path in the ranges below to draw letters.

#### Signpost Puzzle Rules

- Connect all the squares together into a numbered sequence starting at 1.
- Every square's arrow points towards the square that follows it.
- The next square in the sequence can be any distance away in the given direction.
- See 1-5 in the Practice Puzzle then find 6-15 to get started.





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This puzzle is based on a logic puzzle known as Battleships. Solve the three logic puzzles according to the given rules, then read the letters in the grid from all spaces that contain a Ferry (length 3 ship) to discover the singing frog has a CHILD WITHIN (playing the bassoon).

Locate the Frogland Fleet on the grids below.

Each grid has one Ferry (length 3), two Tugboats (length 2), and three Rowboats (length 1). No two boats can be next to each other, even diagonally.

The numbers indicate the number of cells in that row or column that contain a boat.



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To begin, revisit each of the main puzzles and uncover one new answer for each of them. These are **"Doubly Beastly Solutions"** because they each contain the names of two animals.
